
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Why book this trip?

DAY 1 - Join trip in Vancouver

Upon arrival into Vancouver Airport (YVR) please collect your luggage and look for a representative in the Arrivals Hall, holding a sign with your name on it. If you have booked your flights independently, please make sure that you have advised us of your arrival flight details so that a transfer is booked for you. Be sure to keep all of your important documents - i.e. passport and travel insurance, and also your medication in your hand luggage, as your main luggage will be transferred separately to the hotel.

Upon check-in, the reception staff will provide you with your cabin tags. Please fill out the luggage tags clearly, showing your name and cabin number to allow us to

Your expedition crew will share their knowledge of the area and teach you about the wildlife that you spot from the ship's deck, as you explore the tiny inlets of this famous stretch of water.

DAY 5 - Metlakatla, Misty Fjords National Monument

On Annette Island, experience the extraordinary history, art, and cultural traditions of the Tsimshian tribe of the Metlakatla Indian Community, the only Indian Reserve in Alaska. While on shore, choose one of the following excursions:-

Option one - Enjoy an 8km hike to Yellow Hill, a challenging walk with rewarding panoramic views of Metlakatla and Annette Bay, walking mostly on timber board walks, stairs, and moderately steep terrain. Visit the community Long House to learn about the building's history and traditions and enjoy a dance performance from a local Tsimshian dance group. Visit the Artist Village next door to see handicrafts made by local artists, with an opportunity to buy a souvenir to take back home.

Option two - Walking Town Tour & Totem Pole Journey. The Totem Exploration Journey is a path that guides you to the Totems & points of interest of Metlakatla. On a guided walk, you get a close-up view of the fascinating, hand-crafted cedar carvings scattered throughout Metlakatla. During the excursion, you'll discover the 14 totem poles standing in Metlakatla, all carved by local artists, you'll visit several historical and cultural points of interest, including the William Duncan Memorial Church, the Metlakatla

Indian Community Longhouse, and the Artist Village.

Option three - Skater's Lake Trail Walk & Totem Journey. On this scenic timber boardwalk, you'll experience the lush scenery at Skater's Lake. Afterwards, visit the community Long House to learn about the building's history and traditions, and where you will enjoy a dance performance. Afterwards, visit the Artist

Village next door to see handicrafts made by local artists, available for purchase.

Later, we sail in Misty Fjords National Monument, a wilderness area characterised by towering granite cliffs, shrouded in mist and glacial valleys. The area is a haven for wildlife, we explore the area by Zodiac, searching for grizzly and black bear, whale, mountain goat and deer.



DAY 6 - Wrangell, Thomas Bay and Baird Glacier

Disembark in historic Wrangell, an important town that was founded by Russians in 1834 and which once thrived on fur and gold trading. Enjoy Wrangell's main highlights, including a visit to Petroglyph Beach to see ancient rock carvings and a visit to the city museum to learn about Wrangell's colourful history. The alternative shore excursion is a visit to Tongass Rainforest. Explore the rainforest on a guided walk on the Wrangell Nature Trail. In the afternoon, we will drop anchor in Thomas Bay, a wilderness location shrouded in the mysterious local legends, where we stop to explore around Baird Glacier.

DAY 7 - Frederick Sound

Frederick Sound is a summer feeding ground for the northern hemisphere's largest concentration of humpback whale. Keep watch for humpback, orca, and Steller's sea lion. In Tracy Arm, glide along the steep walled fjords of a watery wilderness area that has been likened to Yosemite and enjoy views of snow-covered mountains. Zodiac-cruise in search of wildlife at the back of the Tracy Arm, home to the twin Sawyer Glaciers. Keep a lookout for harbour seal resting on 'bergy bits' which calve regularly from the active tidewater glaciers.



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

DAY 8 - Juneau and Mendenhall Glacier

Nestled at the base of towering mountains overlooking the Gastineau Channel, Juneau's rich culture, and history is reflected throughout the town. In Alaska's scenic capital, we visit nearby Mendenhall Glacier. The glacier is 2.4 km wide and is fed by the Juneau Icefield and ranks as the largest, most rugged glacier that is accessible by road in Alaska. Hike the trails nearby and enjoy panoramic views. Back in town, enjoy free time to explore and learn about Juneau's local history with a visit to the newly-built Alaska State Museum.

DAY 9 - Icy Strait, Inian Islands and Elfin Cove

The area around Icy Strait features the Inian Islands, George Island, Point Adolphus and Elfin Cove and offers some of the best opportunities for Zodiac-cruising and kayaking. Here you can find an abundance of iconic Alaskan wildlife, including whale, Steller sea lion, sea otter, harbour seal, bald eagle and brown bear.

DAY 10 - Hubbard Glacier

As we sail west across the Gulf of Alaska, our expert team will entertain you with informative talks on wildlife, glaciers, and the rich history of Alaska - from indigenous settlement through to the Russian fur trade and the European rush for gold. In the afternoon we arrive in Disenchantment Bay, home to Hubbard Glacier, North America's largest tidewater Glacier, where we search for Kittlitz's murrelet,

Aleutian tern and brown bear hunting salmon along the shore.



DAY 11 - Kayak Island

Kayak Island is the remote, uninhabited spot where in 1741, zoologist and botanist Georg Wilhelm Steller became one of the first Europeans to set foot on Alaskan soil. Serving as naturalist on Vitus Bering's voyage to explore a sea route from Russia to North America, Steller recorded the first evidence of Alaskan Inuit and catalogued an array of flora and fauna, many of which now bear his name. If weather permits, we will explore Cape Saint Elias and its lighthouse by Zodiac.



DAY 12 - Prince William Sound

Framed by the impressive Chugach Mountains, we spend two days exploring Prince William Sound, an area of rugged coastline that is home to more tidewater glaciers than anywhere else on Earth. Zodiac-cruise among icebergs, and forest-covered islands that are rich in wildlife including puffin, sea lion and seal. Glacier Island at the opening of Columbia Bay offers great wildlife encounters, vast amounts of sea ice, diverse geological formations and sea caves.

DAY 13 - Prince William Sound

Columbia and Meares Glaciers are both extremely active and produce vast quantities of ice where seal haul out on icebergs in front of them. Granite Bay features steep cliff walls where the northernmost stand of yellow cedars is found, and where mountain goat can be seen clinging to the cliff face. Kayak in College Fjord, with several glaciers named after Ivy League universities such as Harvard and Yale, which funded the 1899 exploration and discovery of the fjord.

May-Sep is the best time to visit, when the weather is usually warm, dry and pleasant. Temperatures can be a little cooler on the coast and in the mountains; rain can be expected at any time. Early in the season, there can be snow in some areas which may limit walking possibilities.

Climate

There are great variations in the altitude and terrain of the areas visited and this is reflected in the temperatures. Desert areas can be extremely hot in the summer months (49°), though temperatures can drop dramatically at night. The mountains are cooler and wetter especially in the north of the Rockies. At the beginning and end of the season there may still be some snow around in the high passes and it can be cold, whereas in mid-summer the day time temperatures can soar.

Budgeting and packing

Optional activities

The following excursions and/or activities are usually available and may be arranged locally. Estimated costs are provided below for guidance only, are on a per person basis unless shown otherwise, and may depend on the number of participants. Please note: These activities are booked and paid for direct with the supplier and do not form part of your Explore holiday contract.

Whilst landings are included in the cost of your trip as per the outline itinerary, some departures aboard the *MV Sylvia Earle* have additional optional activities which can be pre-booked with the ship operator directly. These will be charged at an additional fee, depending on the activity and we recommend booking these in advance to ensure availability. Please speak to a member of our Polar team who will advise you on the booking process.

Clothing

Parkas

You should look for a lightweight, roomy, wind and water-resistant parka with some insulation. Bright colors are more visible - and thus safer - in polar environments.

Gloves

Keeping your hands warm and dry can be a challenge. Thin polypropylene gloves can be worn underneath warm outergloves. This allows you some protection from the cold when removing your gloves to operate your camera etc. We strongly recommend that you bring more than one pair of gloves,

in case one gets wet (or lost).

Hat/Cap

Warm, woollen hat/cap to protect your ears, as well as a scarf, neck gaiter or other face protection, such as a balaclava.

Trousers

Water-resistant trousers of coated nylon or, even better, Gore-Tex® are essential for your comfort. They can be worn over your regular clothes to keep you warm and dry. We suggest that you purchase trousers a few sizes larger than you normally wear as you will be wearing them over other clothing. Gore-Tex® or similar fabrics are excellent for keeping out wind and water without trapping excess heat. Rain gear and Gore-Tex® products can be found in any outdoor sport clothing store. In addition to your waterproof trousers, warm ski pants are suggested if you have them. Warm trousers such as jeans, corduroys etc are also good.

Socks

Warm wool socks worn over a thin pair of silk, polypropylene socks should provide enough warmth and insulation for your feet. Bring several pairs of socks, since you will inevitably get your feet wet.

Outer Clothing Woollen, knit or cotton sweaters/tops, polar fleece tops (medium weight), several cotton turtlenecks and T-shirts for layering on and off the ship.

Underclothing

Thermal underwear is highly recommended as it will keep you warm without adding bulk. Most polar travellers prefer a lightweight version.

Footwear

Complimentary waterproof boots will be supplied on-board. However, if you have extra small or large feet, you are advised to bring your own. Also ensure you take good walking boots and trainers for relaxing.

Ship description

The Sylvia Earle is a purpose-built expedition vessel and is the sister ship to the M/V Greg Mortimer. Built with the same revolutionary Ulstein X-Bow design, which allows the ship to comfortably navigate the ice, the Sylvia Earle features a distinctive glass atrium lounge at the bow of the vessel which offers stunning panoramic views. Other features include a swimming pool and Jacuzzi, from which you can soak up the passing scenery. With just 134 passengers, guests can enjoy spacious stateroom cabins and suites, a large mud room and easy boarding access at water level. The ship also has a library and multimedia room, gym, sauna and spa.

Cabins

The lead-in prices on our website are based on triple outward facing, Stateroom cabins. All staterooms have private bathrooms, ample storage, with twin beds. Many of the stateroom categories, have floor to ceiling windows that offer prime observation opportunities around the clock. Additionally, there are private balconies in most of the staterooms, allowing you to watch the world float past and take in the salty air of the open ocean. Your confirmed cabin type will appear on your Booking Confirmation, which will be sent on receipt of your deposit payment.

Visa and Passport Information

All visa information is subject to change. You should confirm all visa related issues with the relevant Embassy prior to departure.

USA (If flights transit): you will need to apply for an ESTA if you are transiting the USA as you will have to disembark and clear immigration before re-boarding for the onward flight.

Citizens of the UK, New Zealand, Australia, Canada and passport holders from several EU countries can enter the United States without a visa under the Visa Waiver Program (VWP) - where you apply for an ESTA (Electronic System for Travel Authorisation), which applies if you enter the country by sea or by air. This must be done on line - <https://esta.cbp.dhs.gov> no later than 72 hours prior to travel.

Travellers who have not registered before their trip are likely be refused boarding. When completing an application for transit you should enter the words 'In Transit' with your final destination location in the address line

You must have an electronic passport with a digital chip containing biometric information about the passport owner. UK passports which are biometric feature a small gold symbol (camera) at the bottom of the front cover.

If you have visited Iraq, Syria, Iran or Sudan in the past five years or are dual nationals of these countries, you cannot travel under the Visa Waiver Programme. Instead you will need to apply for a visa from the

nearest US Embassy or Consulate. If you are unable to provide a valid visa before boarding flights to the US, or entering via another method, you may not be permitted to travel.

Joining Tour Abroad

Customers booked on the 'Land Only' arrangements will receive a Free Transfer, provided you arrive and depart on the tour only itinerary start and end dates. The complimentary transfers will be arranged from the Explore designated airport or train station to your trips joining point, and then back from the ending point to the designated airport or train station. Generally the airport or station that Explore have selected will be the one that is closest to the town or city where the trip starts, or the one nearest to the joining point. It will be either an airport or train station but not both.

The exception to this rule is customers who are booked on a tour where the joining and ending point is at the designated airport or train station.

Free transfers are not available for Self-Guided, Polar, Tailormade or Tours for Churches customers.

If you are not eligible for the Free Transfer then you will need to make your own way through to the joining and ending point. On a majority of our tours Explore will be able to provide a private transfer at an additional cost. Please ask for a quote at the time of booking.
