Itinerary

DAY 1 - Join trip in Sofia

Join the trip in Sofia, Bulgaria's capital, and check-in to our hotel. Sofia has a long history which can be seen by the onion-domed churches, Ottoman mosques, Roman ruins and old Soviet monuments. However, it is largely modern and youthful with a wealth of museums, art galleries, cafes and restaurants.

Depending on your flight times or if you're extending your stay by a night then you may like to visit the Archaeological Museum where there are Thracian, Roman and medieval artefacts on display in a former mosque dating from 1496. Or perhaps the ancient ruins of Serdica, which were discovered during the building of a new metro station and where you can see a partially excavated section of eight streets, an early Christian church and a bathhouse from this old Roman city.

This evening you'll have your first chance to sample Bulgarian cuisine. Food in Bulgaria tends to be made from fresh local produce and dinner usually starts with a salad such as shopska salata consisting of tomatoes, cucumbers, peppers and white cheese. Other specialities include kebapche, small and spicy minced meat rolls, and sarmi, stuffed cabbage or vine leafs. Both red and white wines are popular, as is the local brandy rakia and the aniseed spirit mastika.

DAY 2 - Discover medieval Veliko Tarnovo and the Tsarevets Fortress

This morning we will drive around three hours to one of Bulgaria's oldest towns, Veliko Tarnovo. Not regularly frequented by tourists this sleepy mountain town is a hidden treasure, which exudes medieval history with its fortified walls, cobbled ramshackle lanes and the mighty Tsarevets Fortress, which was formerly the city citadel. We will walk up to this fort, which was once home to the tsars, to some of the ruins of over 400 houses, more than a dozen churches and the Royal Palace. We will also visit the Asen Dynasty Monument and the handicraft market, Samovodska Charshiya, which has changed little over the past two centuries. This street is lined with small antique shops displaying communist relics and craft shops where local artisans hammer jewellery and paint religious icons.

DAY 3 - See crumbling Communist monuments and the Black Sea coast

We drive towards the Black Sea coast, but stop along the way at the Monument to 1,300 Years of Bulgaria in Shumen. Built in 1981 this massive concrete structure sits on a hilltop and is visible from around 30 kilometres away. The Cubist style figures show kings and heroes from Bulgaria's past in such a way that won't seem out of place in 'Lord of the Rings' novel.

We arrive in Varna and visit the Park-Monument Dedicated to the Bulgarian-Soviet Friendship. Built once again on a hilltop this large v-wing shaped concrete statue is an imposing sight. To reach the statue we need to climb the 300 plus steps of the Staircase of Victory and from the top the Brutalist style giant soldiers loom over us menacingly.

The rest of the afternoon is free to explore more of Varna. The town sits on the Black Sea coast and it's not uncommon at this time of year for the waves to freeze along the seafront in spectacular icicle displays. You might like to take a stroll through the largest landscaped park in the Balkans, the Sea Garden, where there are a variety of sculptures. If the weather is too cold to be outside for long then there's the opportunity to visit the Retro Car Museum which is dedicated to the Socialist period from

1945-1989 where you can see everyday items, vintage cars and wax-works of famous personalites from the time. There's also the chance to have a wine tasting of five locally produced wines accommpanied with some snacks.

DAY 4 - Visit to UNESCO-Listed coastal Nessebar en route to the Rose Valley

This morning we drive further along the coast to the UNESCO-Listed ancient city of Nessebar. Situated on a rocky peninsula it was originally a Thracian settlement before becoming a Greek colony. Most of the remains are from the Hellenistic period including the Temple of Apollo, acropolis and section of the old city walls. There are also the ruins of a Byzantine fortress and colourful 19th century wooden houses. Whilst here we'll visit the town's most impressive church - Saint Stephen, which has been expanded over the years since the 11th century and contains an array of different elements from various time periods including over 250 colourful murals depicting Biblical scenes. We will also visit the Archaeological Museum, which explains more about the town's long history.

Following our visit we drive on to Kazanlak in the heart of the Rose Valley and our Explore Leader will take us a brief introduction walk of the town. The Rose Valley sits between the Middle Forest Mountain and the Balkan Mountains, and the rosa damascene variety of flower has been cultivated here for centuries to produce rose oil.

DAY 5 - Go to Shipka Memorial Church and see abandoned Soviet monuments

Our first stop today is deep in the mountains at the monument at the peak of the Shipka Pass where we'll learn about the battle that took place here. Also later today we will visit the Shipka Memorial Church. Its tall bell tower, golden domes and intricately decorated red and white exterior stand out somewhat from the remote surrounding tree covered hills. The church is dedicated to the Russian soldiers who gave their lives in the Battles of Shipka Pass. The names of the fallen soldiers are inscribed on walls of the church's crypt and its bells are cast from battlefield cartridges and are extremely heavy, weighing up to 12 tons.

At Buzludzha peak we'll stop by at an abandoned Soviet monument, which resembles a large concrete UFO, which has now been strewn with graffiti, and is parked next to a tall pillar with a red star window at the top.

Our last stop today is at the Monument to the Defenders of Stara Zagora. This large stone and steel Brutalist memorial statue is to remember the 14,000 soldiers that lost their lives in the defence of the city back in the 1800s. It depicts a Russian officer commanding a force of Bulgarian volunteer soldiers.

Late this afternoon we drive to Plovdiv where we spend the next two nights.

Please note that if road conditions are poor due to ice or snow then we might be unable to drive over the Shipka Pass and we'll need to take an alternative route.

DAY 6 - Explore Plovdiv on foot including the Roman Theatre

Plovdiv is an ancient city built on seven hills, and it is in fact Europe's oldest continuously inhabited city. Its old town's winding cobbled lanes are crammed with colourful mansion houses that have been turned into museums, galleries, shops and restaurants. It will be Europe's Capital of Culture in 2019.

Our Explore Leader will take us on a tour of the highlights of Plovdiv this morning. The most famous of which is probably the well preserved Roman Theatre of Philipoppol, which is still used for concerts and theatrical performances. The rows of marble seats are set on a hillside with views over the city sprawling below it.

This afternoon is free for you to discover more of the old town and perhaps to visit the Ethnographic Museum, which is housed in an 1847 merchant's house. You could stroll among the National Revival era colourful houses, as well as going into the Church of Saint Constantine and Helena.

DAY 7 - Explore Sophia, see Socialist art and have a Communist style dinner

We drive back to Sofia this morning and on arrival our Explore Leader will take us on walking tour where we will go into the Neo-Byzantine Alexander Nevsky Cathedral, which was built to commemorate the 200,000 Russian soldiers who died fighting for Bulgaria's independence. We'll also see remnants from the city's Soviet era when we visit the huge Palace of Culture exhibition centre and Independence Square or the Largo, as it's also known, which is regarded as being one of the best displays of Socialist Classicism architecture that remains in Eastern Europe.

We'll then take the metro to visit the Monument to the Soviet Army, which is a tribute to the Russian soldiers who died supporting Bulgarian efforts during World War II and is surrounded by a large park. In recent years its sculpted bronze statues have frequently been vandalised with them being painted in a pop art style. The paint keeps being removed by the authorities and then a new design will appear a short time later. The statues have been bright pink, painted in the style of comic book heroes and villains, in the colours of the Bulgarian flag, and more, so who knows what the statues will look like when we visit them.

Next we'll visit the Museum of Socialist Art where we'll find many of the items removed from around the country when Soviet times came to an end such as unwanted statues of Lenin, the red star from Sofia's Party House and footage from old propaganda films.

This evening we'll have a 3-course dinner in the unusual Raketa Rakia Bar, which is designed to transport us back to the times of the communist regime. They serve traditional dishes and a wide selection of rakia.

DAY 8 - Visit the Rila Monastery and attend the colourful Surva Festival

This morning we drive to the UNESCO World Heritage Site of Rila Monastery, set in a strikingly beautiful mountain valley; it is a hugely important religious and cultural centre for the Bulgarian people. Remaining in wonderful condition it has the most stunning brightly coloured frescoes and distinctive striped brickwork. Originally founded in the 10th century the monastery served to preserve Bulgarian culture during the 400 years of Ottoman rule and was a hiding place for the Bulgarian revolutionaries. Today the magnificent church and its museum house a priceless collection of frescoes, gilded iconostasis and religious art and artefacts.

Later this afternoon we drive to Pernik to attend the opening day of the Surva International Festival of Masquerade Games, which is the oldest festival of its kind in Bulgaria. This small industrial town annually during this one weekend in January becomes awash with colour and has done since the festivals inauguration in 1966. In 2015 UNESCO designated the festival as being a site of intangible cultural heritage, as it is a unique event that is unlike anything else held worldwide and displays traditions that were almost entirely lost during Bulgaria's years of communist rule. It is a celebration of ancient folklore and pagan traditions, which is little known by Western tourists. Participants dress in a wonderfully weird array of elaborate costumes and masks including fluffy outfits that resemble large mythical beasts that are designed to ward off evil spirits and bring good luck for the upcoming spring harvest. Outfits are typically made from sheep skin and wool and decorated with colourful beads, ribbons, wood, fabrics, paper mache and animal horns, and are accessorised with floral headdresses and bell-laden belts. About 100 groups from every folklore region of Bulgaria attend, as well as a few international participants, and usually there are about 6,000 visitors at the event. The masks vary depending on the region the participants are from and those taking part in the festivities are known as Kukeri. Originally all the Kukeri would have been single men trying to attract a wife, but nowadays more women and children are also becoming involved. During the parades we'll get to experience a variety of colourful customs, folk songs and dances, as well as seeing a number of outdoor exhibitions around the town.

Late this evening we drive about 35 minutes back to Sofia.

DAY 9 - Watch the parades at the Surva Festival

Today we'll return to Pernik to spend the whole day enjoying the sights and sounds of the celebrations. As well as watching the parades there'll be the chance to see culinary demonstrations and of course to try the hearty warming winter food that is on offer, such as spit roast pork, kavarma stew made with pork or chicken and vegetables in a clay pot or banitsa, a salty pastry made with plenty of eggs and cheese. There will of course be plenty of Bulgarian wine, beer and rakia to try too.

The teams at the parade are all competing against one another within different categories that include children and youth groups. So young and old alike come to take part and watch the festivities. Participates will do the kuker dance, which is an ancient ritual where their masks and bells are their weapons against evil spirits that lurk in the basements and attics of the towns houses. The performers will therefore go from house to house to scare these spirits away and bring good luck, health and happiness to the residents living there. There will be a bazaar at the festival where you can buy a range of handmade souvenirs and also a bell and a mask and should you choose to join in with the dancing through the streets. The masks usually include the colour red to symbolise fertility and the sun, black to represent Mother Earth and white to signify light and water - all the things you need for a successful spring harvest.

We drive back to Sofia this evening.

Clothing

We recommend packing warm layers of breathable fabrics including a fleece/jumper and taking a winter hat that covers your ears, waterproof gloves (and glove liners for when you're taking photos), a scarf, thick hiking socks and sufficient waterproofs including a windproof jacket and trousers. You may also find thermal underwear, ski trousers or salopettes, a ski jacket and a ski face/neck mask useful. Ladies should take a headscarf to cover their head when entering religious sites.

Joining Tour Abroad

Customers booked on the 'Land Only' arrangements will now receive a Free Transfer, provided you arrive and depart on the tour only itinerary start and end dates. The complimentary transfers will be arranged from the Explore designated airport or train station to your trips joining point, and then back from the ending point to the designated airport or train station. Generally the airport or station that Explore have selected will be the one that is closest to the town or city where the trip starts, or the one nearest to the joining point. It will be either an airport or train station but not both.

The exception to this rule is customers who are booked on a tour where the joining and ending point is at the designated airport or train station.
