Why book this trip?

At the edge of the Arctic, Yellowknife is a remote hub in Canada's white north. Only 400km south of the Arctic Circle, and with predominantly clear skies, this is one of the best places in the world for spotting the Aurora Borealis - the famous Northern Lights. With three nights of Aurora hunting in cabins off the Great Slave Lake, we have an excellent chance of spotting the lights dancing across the sky on this trip.

- **Yellowknife is so far north that the Northern Lights appear in late summer to early autumn as well as through the winter, so you have two different itineraries to choose from** - perfect if you love winter activities, or if you prefer to explore Canada's beautiful autumn colours before an evening spent looking for the Northern Lights.

DAY 1 - Join trip in Yellowknife

The trip starts today in Yellowknife, the capital of Canada's Northwest Territories. In an area originally settled by First Nations peoples, the city has a small-town feel. Since the discovery of diamonds in 1991, Yellowknife has become a mining hub, with much of the town's economy revolving around the mining industry.

DAY 2 - Explore Yellowknife on foot; aurora chasing from overnight cabins

We'll get our bearings in this small city today, exploring both the old town and the downtown districts on foot. Full of prospecting history and set on the banks of the enormous Great Slave Lake, wandering the old town is a fascinating glimpse into the remote Canadian lifestyle.

The rest of the afternoon is free to explore, perhaps to visit one of the historical museums or to spend time in the many small local coffee shops that are springing up around the city. At some point today, our Tour Leader will also be distributing our winter gear. Temperatures can sometimes get as low as -28 degrees centigrade at night, so you'll be given a thick parka, insulated snow trousers, winter boots, mitts, hat and a thick buff/neck warmer.

This evening we'll pack an overnight bag - while most of the trip we only head out to wilderness cabins for approximately four hours before returning to the hotel, tonight we will be staying overnight to get a better taste of the remote Northwest Territories. The cabins are simple, with no running water (gallon jugs of water will be provided for washing and cooking), outdoor toilets and bunkbeds, with approximately 4-6 people in a room. They have log burning fires, a small kitchen, comfy seats and an outdoor decking area that looks over the Great Slave Lake. Although we'll drive to the cabins with other people that are not from our group, our cabin will be private for our use only.

DAY 3 - Ice fishing on Great Slave Lake; evening Aurora chasing

Hopefully the spectacle of the Northern Lights will have kept us up late last night, so we'll have a little lie-in before breakfast at the cabin. This will be a simple breakfast prepared by our leader. From our cabin, we'll drive around Great Slave Lake to the start of our ice fishing trip - the lakes are fully frozen over at this time of year, but fresh water fish like trout, pike and pickerel are abundant underneath, and we'll spend an enjoyable couple of hours dropping our lines through several feet of ice to try and pull in a big one. We'll also get a hearty lunch cooked up for us (fish, of course!) before heading back to our hotel in Yellowknife. This ice fishing trip is public and therefore there might be other people in our group, up to 24 people maximum.

After spending the evening relaxing, we head back into our special snow tyre vans to drive to our wilderness cabin. We'll spend a good four hours here staying up to await the Northern Lights, returning to Yellowknife at approximately 1-2am. You'll have hot drinks, snacks and biscuits to keep you going - and if you like, bring a book or cards for entertainment as you wait for the light show!

DAY 4 - Snowmobiling excursion; evening Aurora chasing

A winter in Yellowknife wouldn't be complete without the exhilaration of gliding through the snow on a snowmobile, and today we get to do just that. Our guided trip takes us carving through backcountry wilderness, travelling on thickly forested, snowy trails. As we skim across frozen lakes we'll stop along the way to take photos of breathtaking scenery, and to drink a warming hot chocolate too. Helmets are all supplied and we'll put on our winter gear for the ride. Please note that you must be over 18 years of age to do the snowmobiling.

This evening we head out again to the lakeside cabins for our final chance at aurora chasing. Hopefully it will be the third time we'll have seen the Northern Lights during our trip.

Please check that your travel insurance fully covers you for medical and repatriation expenses if you intend to go snowmobiling. The snow mobile operator reserves the right to charge you for any damage you cause to the snowmobile. An excess may be payable in the event of any damage to your snowmobile; this excess, together with any third party liability (damage to someone else or someone else's property whilst driving a snowmobile) may not be covered by your travel insurance policy.

Climate

May-Sep is the best time to visit, when the weather is usually warm, dry and pleasant. Temperatures can be a little cooler on the coast and in the mountains; rain can be expected at any time. Early in the season, there can be snow in some areas which may limit walking possibilities.

Budgeting and packing

Optional activities

The following excursions and/or activities are usually available and may be arranged locally. Estimated costs are provided below for guidance only, are on a per person basis unless shown otherwise, and may depend on the number of participants. Prices quoted are correct as of the date these tour notes were originally issued but may change at any time due to currency fluctuations. Please note: These activities are booked and paid for direct with the supplier and do not form part of your Explore holiday contract.

All activities are included within the tour.

Please note that if your group size is fewer than 4 passengers, you may be joining other non-Explore customers for the planned activities during your trip.

Clothing

During the winter departures (December to March), temperatures can sometimes get as low as -40 degrees centigrade at night so winter gear will be provided, which covers a thick parka, insulated snow pants, winter boots, mitts, hat and a thick buff/neck warmer.

In autumn, no specialist gear is provided but during the aurora watching nights it will be cold outside so we recommend a warm wind and waterproof jacket, thermal layers, jumper, hat, gloves, thick socks and scarf or snood. Weather is usually crisp and sunny in the daytime, so bring layers for cold autumn days, and especially warm layers for your boat trip on the Great Slave Lake.

Footwear

Winter snow boots will be provided for our winter departures, but you may also wish to bring some thick boots or hiking boots just for walking around Yellowknife. For autumn departures we also recommend hiking shoes or boots and warm socks.

Luggage

Luggage: On tour

You will need a day pack for personal items. You could also use this as a small overnight bag for taking over to the cabins.

Equipment

For all departures, we recommend that you bring a small torch/headtorch, water bottle, sunglasses and a medical kit. We also recommend taking your camera and to get the best pictures of the Northern Lights it is advisable to take a tripod and use a camera with a long-exposure setting.

Tipping

Explore leader

At your discretion you might also consider tipping your Tour Leader in appreciation of the efficiency and service you receive.

Local crew

In North America tipping 15%-20% is a recognised part of life across the service industry, including restaurants, activity suppliers, taxis and guides. Local staff will look to you for personal recognition of particular services provided.

Unlike other Explore trips, during our trips in North America our Explore leaders will not operate a tips kitty. However, they will be more than happy to provide guidance throughout the trip on who to tip when and to suggest appropriate amounts.

Accommodation notes

You'll spend one night in an overnight cabin overlooking the Great Slave Lake, a perfect remote location for viewing the Northern Lights. These are simple - no running water (although gallon jugs of water are provided for washing and cooking), outdoor toilets and bunkbeds. During Autumn departures there is a separate shower building open, which has two shower stalls with hot water. The rest of the trip you will go up to the cabins for around 4 hours to hunker down and wait for the aurora, before returning to the hotel in Yellowknife.

Visa and Passport Information

When travelling to Canada, you will need the following:

ETA - Citizens of the UK, New Zealand, Australia and passport holders from several EU countries can apply for an ETA here - <http://www.cic.gc.ca/english/visit/eta.asp> - other nationalities should consult their local embassy or consular office.

ESTA - only if transiting via the USA

Citizens of the UK, New Zealand, Australia and passport holders from several EU countries can apply for an ESTA here - <https://esta.cbp.dhs.gov> - you must have an electronic passport with a digital chip containing biometric information. If you have visited Libya, Iran, Iraq, Somalia, Sudan, Syria or Yemen since March 2011, or dual national of these countries, you cannot travel with an ESTA. In this case you will need to apply for a visa from the nearest US embassy or consulate.

I94 - The I94 is a history of entries and exits to the US. You can get this online here for \$6 - <https://i94.cbp.dhs.gov/i94/#/home> - as each i94 accessed is only valid for border crossings for 7 days, it is best to apply for this when in country - your Explore Leader will assist you with this.

If you do require assistance in obtaining a visa then you may consider applying through Explore's recommended visa service in the UK, Travcour. See www.travcour.com to download the relevant visa application for your trip, if applicable (UK citizens only), along with details of how to apply for your visa through Travcour. The Team at Travcour will be happy to answer specific questions relating to visa applications, please call them directly on 0208 5431846.

It is your responsibility to ensure that you are in possession of a full passport, with the correct validity for your chosen destination.

Booking a land only package with Explore

Customers who have chosen to book on the 'Land Only' arrangements of our tour, please ensure that you have checked your tour specific 'Joining Instructions' prior to booking your own travel arrangements. Your joining instructions can be found below in the dates and prices information.

You may also be eligible for the Free Explore Transfer.

Joining Tour Abroad

Customers booked on the 'Land Only' arrangements will now receive a Free Transfer, provided you arrive and depart on the tour only itinerary start and end dates. The complimentary transfers will be arranged from the Explore designated airport or train station to your trips joining point, and then back from the ending point to the designated airport or train station. Generally the airport or station that Explore have selected will be the one that is closest to the town or city where the trip starts, or the one nearest to the

joining point. It will be either an airport or train station but not both.

The exception to this rule is customers who are booked on a tour where the joining and ending point is at the designated airport or train station.

Free transfers are not available for Self-Guided, Polar, Tailormade or Tours for Churches customers.

If you are not eligible for the Free Transfer then you will need to make your own way through to the joining and ending point. On a majority of our tours Explore will be able to provide a private transfer at an additional cost. Please ask for a quote at the time of booking.

Insurance

It is a condition of booking with Explore that you have adequate valid travel insurance. It is your responsibility to arrange appropriate travel insurance and ensure you have read and understood the full terms and conditions of your travel insurance policy to ensure that you are covered for all activities you intend to undertake whilst on the tour, including all optional activities. Your Insurance Policy must fully cover you for medical expenses and emergency repatriation to your home country. Please ensure your policy includes medical emergency helicopter evacuation in the event of illness or injury and covers the entire duration of your holiday. If you are trekking at altitude please ensure that there is no upper altitude limit which may limit or exclude cover for your trip. The cost of many of our Polar Voyages will exceed the capped amount covered by standard insurance premiums and you will be required to pay an additional premium to cover the full value of your trip. Please ensure that you are covered for the full amount of your holiday cost, as insufficient cover could invalidate a claim under the policy. Medical and repatriation insurance cover is not mandatory for UK residents who are travelling on trips within the United Kingdom.
