We will photograph the fabled rock-hewn city of Petra, gaining special access to the site before the crowds, capture the Druze tribes in Azraq, and spend time in the desert in Wadi Rum, seeking out some spectacular desert scenes and experiencing the Bedouin lifestyle.

DAY 1 - Join trip in Amman

We join our tour in Amman, the capital of Jordan and one of the oldest continuously inhabited cities in the world. Now home to almost half of the country's population, it is a fascinating city of contrasts, where the very ancient and the modern collide.

DAY 2 - Capture the Roman city of Jerash in the morning light, photograph the Druze of Azraq and explore the Amman's souks

This morning we drive north of the capital to ancient Jerash. Populated for over 6,500 years, the city's golden age was in Roman times when it was conquered by General Pompey and became one of a confederation of ten allied Middle Eastern cities known as the Decapolis League. Now, because of the way was preserved in sand before its excavation, it is widely acknowledged as one of the best-preserved Roman provincial towns in the world. Walking around the colonnaded streets, soaring hilltop temples, impressive theatres and its chariot-racing stadium, it is easy to imagine Roman life carrying on around you. We arrive at the site very early to take advantage of the warm morning light and beat the crowds, spending several hours exploring and photographing the site's columns, squares and ancient streets.

After leaving Jerash we travel to Azraq where there is a large community of Druze people. They follow a faith which is considered a sect of Islam, but includes elements based on the teachings ancient philosophers such as Plato and Aristotle. They are not required to adhere to the traditional five pillars of Islam and reincarnation is one of their key beliefs. Conversion is not permitted so a Druze must be born in to the faith. A distinct style of dress consisting of black or dark blue robes and white headgear, along with impressive moustaches, make them very photogenic. We have the the opportunity to take lunch with a local Druze family and photograph them in their traditional attire.

In the afternoon we return to Amman and take a stroll through the markets and souks in the early evening light. Busy and full of local people, we'll be able to capture the daily life of the capital, its bustling street scenes and colourful market stalls.

DAY 3 - Photograph the old town of As Salt and the Dead Sea before driving to Petra

On the old highway from Amman to Jerusalem lies the ancient town of As Salt and we'll stop here before heading south to the Dead Sea. Believed to have been built during the time of Alexander the Great, As Salt is littered with the remnants of its long history including Roman tombs, a 13th century fortress and impressive Ottoman houses and mansions from the town's most prosperous period in the late 19th century. We'll wander around the town and capture the architecture and old streets, seemingly from a time gone by, before departing for the Dead Sea.

The Dead Sea is so called due to its very high salinity which creates an environment in which life cannot

exist, and it is also the world's lowest point. We seek out a section of the coast where there are salt formations and an interesting coastline, providing us with some foreground for our shots. We spend a few hours working our way along the coast, finding the most photogenic spots, before continuing to Petra.

DAY 4 - Photograph the beautiful 'Rose-Red City' of Petra


Over the next two days we explore and photograph the mysterious and beautiful city of Petra. We have special permission to enter before the site opens for the day so we can be in position to get our shots before the crowds arrive, and take advantage of the golden morning light as it illuminates this wonderful location.

Famously referred to as 'a rose red city half as old as time', Petra is a UNESCO World Heritage Site, and also made the list of the new wonders of the world which was produced in 2001. The ancient city is carved from the living rock and has retained its grandeur throughout the centuries; nothing really prepares you for your first visit here. Accessed by walking through a kilometre-long chasm known as the Siq, the walls of which soar to a height of 200m, Petra's most famous monument, the Treasury, appears dramatically at the end, carved out of the sheer, dusky-pink rock face - it's a great spot for capturing an iconic image. The Treasury's miraculously well-preserved 43 metre-high facade dwarfs everything around it and perfectly represents the engineering genius of the Nabataean people who built the site some time between the 4th and 1st centuries BC.

There is much more to the site than the Siq and Treasury, and while you wander through literally hundreds of tombs, temples and colonnaded streets, it's easy to imagine caravans loaded with frankincense, spices and textiles travelling along the dusty lanes. Today we can still get an approximation of this scene, and capture it with our cameras, as the local Bedouin who live in the site travel through on camels and donkeys, offering some very authentic photography opportunities.

In the afternoon we return to Petra to shoot the site in afternoon light. For sunset we will drive up to a high vantage point known as Mount Algararah which overlooks Wadi Araba and the surrounding mountains. From the top there stunning views of Wadi Mousa town, the Sharah Mountains and the Wadi Araba desert.

DAY 5 - Continue exploring Petra and visit the site in the evening when it is lit by candlelight

This morning you can return to Petra once again before the site opens, or have free time to visit at your own pace. You may choose to climb the steep path to the 'High Place of Sacrifice' for a view over Wadi Araba and the Negev Desert, or trek up to the impressive 'Monastery' - Petra's largest monument.

In the evening we experience Petra by candle light as the Siq and the Treasury are lit up by hundreds of candles, creating a wonderfully atmospheric scene. Aside from enjoying the spectacle, this gives us the opportunity to get some different shots of the site, and work with the flickering light as it plays on the rocks and the façade of the Treasury.

DAY 6 - Sunrise over Petra and the Araba Mountains and drive to Wadi Rum

We'll be out early once again this morning to capture the sunrise, choosing Mount Braq for its views over Petra and the Araba Mountains. We'll be in position for dawn and stay around to capture the golden light once the sun has risen. After returning to the hotel for breakfast, we visit the nearby abandoned village of al-Ji. Here there are extensive remains of houses dating from the 17th century which we will explore and photograph before driving to the desert and Wadi Rum, the area that was once described by T.E. Lawrence as 'vast, echoing and God-like...'. Wadi Rum is characterised by the huge monolithic outcrops of

granite rock and sandstone that rise out of the desert with a drifting blanket of sand between them. It is at its most impressive at the beginning and end of the day when the soft light and blue sky create a coppery effect on the sand, and we'll make sure we are in a good spot to capture this during the afternoon light and sunset this evening.

The campsite we use in Wadi Rum presents the opportunity to experience traditional Bedouin living arrangements in a large communal goat hair tent which provides the best protection against the desert extremes of hot and cold weather. The tent is where each tribe would come together to eat, sleep and socialise around a fire pit which is used to brew local sweet tea. It will be laid out with traditional rugs, mattresses, pillows and blankets. Far away from the tourist centre and roads, the camp is intimate and provides great views over the desert. A toilet and wash block with showers is available and private tents can be paid for locally subject to availability.

DAY 7 - Early morning photography in Wadi Rum and jeep safari to explore the desert

In the warm morning light we photograph the desert once more before embarking on a Jeep safari, seeking out interesting sand dunes, ancient graffiti and inscriptions carved by people who inhabited the area in the first millennium BC , wild camels and possibly even Bedouin making their way across the desert.

For the afternoon golden hour we'll head out in to the desert again, staying around for sunset. On returning to our camp we enjoy Bedouin hospitality around a campfire and under a blanket of glittering stars; a great setting to share stories while sipping mint and sage tea. In the evening we enjoy a traditional zarb meal. Cooked in an oven with hot coals beneath the desert sands and usually consisting of chicken or goat meat, food has been prepared this way in the desert for hundreds of years. The zarb is accompanied with a delicious selection of mezze such as hummus, mutabbal (which is made from aubergine and sesame seeds) and muhammara, a red pepper dip.

DAY 8 - Travel to Amman via Shobak and Kerak Castles

We have one more opportunity to go out in to the desert this morning before travelling along the 5,000 year-old King's Highway, just as traders, armies and pilgrims have done before us. We stop off at Shobak Castle which dominates the rugged, remote surroundings before continuing to the impressive to Kerak Castle, imposingly situated on a rocky outcrop next to the road, and containing a maze of stone-vaulted halls and passageways. This ancient crusader stronghold is the most famous of a chain of fortresses built for the holy wars against Islam. We arrive back to Amman in the early evening where there'll be time to explore the capital's busy streets once more on our last evening in Jordan.

In spring and autumn evenings can be cool and night temperatures can drop suddenly especially in the desert. Expect cold nights in winter (December to February) when temperatures can drop to around 0 degrees. Some rain should also be expected at this time of year.

Prices quoted are correct as of the date these tour notes were originally issued but may change at any time due to currency fluctuations. Please note: These activities are booked and paid for direct with the supplier and do not form part of your Explore holiday contract.

Petra - Petra by night JD17.00 pp; Ottoman bath JD25.00 pp;

Clothing

Lightweight clothing is recommended, with a sun-hat and neck protection, and a warm sweater and light jacket are advisable for Wadi Rum where early mornings can be very cold.

Women are advised not to wear shorts or dresses that are too revealing as this can attract unwelcome attention in the streets of Islamic towns - loose fitting trousers are ideal.

Comfortable walking shoes or boots, trainers and sandals (good grip is vital for Petra).

Luggage: On tour

One main piece of baggage and a day sack. Hotel porters are not always available, so don't overload

yourself. Please note you will only carry what you need to the camp in Wadi Rum and main luggage will be transported directly from Petra to Aqaba.

Equipment

A torch, good quality sunglasses and high factor sunscreen are all useful to have with you during this trip.

In Wadi Rum, blankets and mattresses are provided, but we suggest you bring your own sleeping sheet. A personal water bottle, small torch and towel are useful for the night here.

Camping at Wadi Rum is wild in a communal tent. Privacy and facilities are thus limited but more than compensated for by the location.

Photography equipment:

Camera - A DSLR or mirrorless camera is recommended to make the most of the photographic opportunities on this trip

Lenses - A range of focal lengths from wide-angle (for landscapes and some street scenes) to telephoto is ideal and a focal length suitable for portraits will be particularly useful (50mm - 85mm for example)

Tripod - A lightweight travel tripod is recommended.

Memory cards - It is a good idea to bring spare memory cards and consider bringing something to download your images on to in case you run out of memory space. While cards can be bought on the trip, they may not be available at all locations and the quality cannot be guaranteed.

Charger / spare battery - You will need to bring your charger and a spare battery may also come in handy.

Tipping

Explore leader

Tipping isn't compulsory, and we work hard to ensure that our leaders all receive a fair wage. However, you might want to recognise a leader that's done a great job or really added to your trip by giving them a tip. We're often asked about the recommended amount. It's a tricky one, and down to personal preference, but we'd recommend between £15 to £20 per person per week as a guideline.

Local crew

Although entirely voluntary, tipping is a recognized part of life in this region of the world. Some local staff will look to members of the group for personal recognition of particular services provided. In order to make things easier for you, your leader may organise a group's tips kitty for included activities and meals and if this is the case, they will account for it throughout the tour.

Accordingly, you should allow JD20.00 (Jordanian Dinar) per person for group tipping.

The Jordanian government levies on all travellers a departure tax of JD 10.00 per person. For travellers departing by air this is usually included in the taxes on the airline ticket and thus nothing will be collected from you at the point of departure. For those travellers departing by land, this will be collected by the immigration authorities at the port of departure from Jordan.

The costs for meals may vary depending upon location, type of restaurant and number of courses eaten and so the prices given are an average guide. Local restaurants located off the beaten track may be less expensive, whereas an upmarket restaurant located in the centre of a major city may charge more.

Sterling and US\$ are widely exchangeable though exchange rates tend to favour the US\$. It is worth taking some money in cash. You may be able to order Dinars from your bank although the rate will usually be lower than purchasing currency in country.

There are high commission charges on Travellers Cheques on a per cheque basis so if using them we suggest you take high denomination cheques. Proof of purchase may be necessary for encashment of Travellers Cheques.

Our desert camp in Wadi Rum in located in a beautiful and little visited part of the Wadi. We sleep in one large communal Bedouin tent and all bedding is provided. There is even a proper toilet! This campsite also has a handful of separate tents, and if availability allows there may be the option to upgrade to your own single tent if you wish. The cost for this should be paid in cash to your Tour Leader and is \$40 per twin tent and \$30 for a single.

Visa and Passport Information

Jordan: The Jordanian government have announced that from 01 June 2015, all visa fees will be waivered for tourists of British, American, Australian, New Zealand and Canadian nationalities on arrival at an international Jordanian airport. There are however, certain conditions that each tourist of these nationalities must meet in order to gain the free visa. Most of these are already met by Explore trips; however flight information, passport details and arrival date into Jordan all have an effect on qualifying for the free visa. Please see below for the category that is applicable to your flight arrangements:

The following information relates to the above nationalities travelling on flights to Jordan arranged by Explore arriving on the first day of the tour: In order to qualify for the free visa, the above nationalities must advise their passport details at least 14 days prior to your departure date to Explore and must be met by a representative who will assist with the visa process, this is already arranged by Explore as part of the transfer arrangements from the airport to the start of the tour.

The following information relates to the above nationalities with Land Only arrangements arriving on the first day of the tour: In order to qualify for the free visa, these tourists must advise their passport details at least 14 days prior to your departure date to Explore and must be met by a representative who will assist with the visa process. Land Only customers of the above nationalities arranging their own flights to arrive in Jordan on the first day of the tour must advise their full flight details to Explore at least 7 days prior to your departure date. We will then arrange for the representative to meet you as part of the

transfer arrangements from the airport to the start of the tour.

The following information relates to the above nationalities arriving in Jordan prior or after the first day of the tour: In order to qualify for the free visa, tourists of the above nationalities must advise their passport details at least 14 days prior to your departure date to Explore and must be met by a representative who will assist with the visa process. To qualify for the free visa, you must contact Explore at least 7 days prior to your departure date to arrange and purchase a private transfer. We will then arrange for the representative to meet you as part of the transfer arrangements.

Please Note: For all tourists of the above nationalities that do not advise their passport details and for all above nationalities that arrange their own travel arrangements and do not advise their flight details to Explore within the above specified timelines, the Jordanian visa fee of JD40.00 (approximately £45) will be applicable. This must be paid on arrival at an international Jordanian airport in order for individuals to gain a visa to enter the country.

All other nationalities should consult the relevant consulate to determine if they are applicable for the above free visa on arrival or must gain a visa prior to departure.

If you do require assistance in obtaining a visa then you may be able to apply through Explore's recommended visa service in the UK, Travcour. See www.travcour.com to download the relevant visa application for your trip, if applicable (UK citizens only), along with details of how to apply for your visa through Travcour. You may also be eligible for the Free Explore Transfer.

Joining Tour Abroad

Customers booked on the 'Land Only' arrangements will now receive a Free Transfer, provided you arrive and depart on the tour only itinerary start and end dates. The complimentary transfers will be arranged from the Explore designated airport or train station to your trips joining point, and then back from the ending point to the designated airport or train station. Generally the airport or station that Explore have

selected will be the one that is closest to the town or city where the trip starts, or the one nearest to the joining point. It will be either an airport or train station but not both.

The exception to this rule is customers who are booked on a tour where the joining and ending point is at the designated airport or train station.

Free transfers are not available for Self-Guided, Polar, Tailormade or Tours for Churches customers. If you are not eligible for the Free Transfer then you will need to make your own way through to the joining and ending point. On a majority of our tours Explore will be able to provide a private transfer at an additional cost. Please ask for a quote at the time of booking.
