

DAY 1 - Nuuk

DAY 2 - Nuuk

The northernmost capital in the world, Nuuk was founded in 1728 by the Norwegian missionary Hans

Egede and has more than 17,000 inhabitants. The centre of Greenland lies at the mouth of its very own fjord system, on the mid-west coast of Greenland. The fjord system, is the second largest fjord system in the world and is one of the country's main drawcards. On an introductory tour, discover Nuuk's contrasting architecture from beautiful old buildings to colourful houses - one of Nuuk's trademarks, with the brightly-coloured houses providing a stark contrast to the rocks or white winter snow. Stop by the newly renovated and roof-covered brættet, where the day's catch of seal, birds and fish are sold. Other attractions in the town include the award-winning cultural centre Katuaq, City Hall, the cathedral from 1849 and the National Museum where you can enjoy a stunning view over the fjord. The museum was established in 1966 and became Greenland's National Museum and Archives, offering a unique ethnographical collection. Discover the famous mummies and costumes from Qilakitsoq in northwest Greenland, as well as the world's oldest and almost completely intact skin boat, the Pearyland Umiaq, whose well-preserved remains are estimated to date back to the 1470s. After discovering Nuuk on a city tour, you will embark the M/V Greg Mortimer in the afternoon, ready to commence your voyage.

DAY 3 - Eternity Fjord

Over the coming days, you will discover the immense beauty of West Greenland and in true expeditionary style, the itinerary will be kept flexible as weather and sea ice will determine where we go and what we see, but our expert crew will ensure that all opportunities are maximised. If weather is in our favour, we will aim to stop at Eternity Fjord. Located north of Maniitsoq town, this beautiful fjord offers numerous glaciers, a chance to Zodiac cruise amongst the ice and incredible mountainous landscapes, which we hope to enjoy on a landing.

DAY 4 - Sisimiut

Greenland's second largest town, Sisimiut is the only place in Greenland that has an open-air public swimming pool and the town is famous for its old blue church with a gate made of whale jaws. The church is located next to the cosy and small museum, featuring a reconstruction of an Inuit turf house. Sisimiut offers hiking trails with various degrees of difficulty. The easier trails take you through the town and its outskirts, as well as into the mountains, where you will find spectacular vantage points.

Sisimiut is located approximately 54 kilometres north of the Arctic Circle, meaning that during summer, you can experience the Midnight Sun here. Approximately 4,500 years ago, the Saqqaq culture arrived from Canada and settled in this area. They lived here for approximately 2,000 years, after which they mysteriously disappeared from the town. The Dorset culture arrived around in AD 500 and stayed until the 1200s, until they were replaced by the Thule culture and today, the majority of the population of Sisimiut are descendants of the Thule culture. The museum in Sisimiut allows you to experience local history, as well as some cultural historical treats, exhibiting early life in Greenland. The town also has a cultural centre - Taseralik Arts Centre, where you can experience concerts, plays, films and much more and its café also offers incredible views of the landscape.

DAY 5 - Ilulissat

Ilulissat is renowned for mountainous icebergs drifting from one of the most productive glaciers in the northern hemisphere an out into the Disko Bay. A short distance south of town is the mindblowing Ilulissat Icefjord, listed as a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 2004, and home of one of the most actively calving glaciers in the world, Sermeq Kujalleq, also known as Jacobshavn glacier. Sermeq Kujalleq produces about 20 million tonnes of ice each day, all floating into the Ilulissat Icefjord and Disko Bay. Ilulissat is the third largest town municipality in Greenland, with more than 5,000 inhabitants. Ilulissat Glacier is the most productive glacier in the northern hemisphere. It is seven kilometres wide and more than a kilometre steep. It produces 43 million tonnes of ice and moves about 50 metres a day and is an incredible sight to experience. Enjoy a Zodiac cruise at the mouth of the fjord, passing through sea ice and surrounded by icebergs. More than 40 million tons of ice flows out into the fjord each day, resulting in gigantic icebergs that can be in excess of 100 metres on each side, with a height of more than 100 metres above the water surface. These giants often become stranded at the end of the fjord, providing excellent opportunities to sail among them. Hiking in Greenland is mostly done on rugged unmarked tracks. However, in Ilulissat there are a few

well-marked routes that take you along the Icefjord. An easy hike to the old settlement at the Icefjord takes about 30-45 minutes from the centre of town, leading to a fantastic spot at the edge of the Icefjord where a former settlement was situated. Different Inuit cultures have lived here during the last 4,000

years and today, you can still find artefacts from this period. Hear the tales of life in Greenland before the Europeans' arrival; see the ruins, the kitchen mitten, and fell the permafrost with your own hands. The route to the edge has a walkway and when you reach the edge of the icefjord, you can walk up a little hill for an even more breathtaking view. A moderate level of fitness and balance is required to summit the small hill, as the terrain is quite rugged.

DAY 6 - Eqip Sermia

Accessible only by sea, the Eqip Sermia glacier is located 80 kilometres north of Ilulissat. It's one of the most active glaciers in Greenland. Although it's smaller than Sermeq Kujalleq glacier in Ilulissat, it's more accessible and if ice conditions permit, we'll Zodiac cruise within safe distance, waiting for chunks of ice to calve and hearing the deafening crash of the ice breaking off, followed by the huge splash when it hits the water. Depending on conditions, we may land our Zodiacs on a moraine and walk close to the glacier.

The Inland Ice Sheet is made of snow and when densely packed, it becomes ice. This procedure puts pressure on the air between the snow flakes and results in air bubbles. When the glacier calves, the air is released and this is what creates the explosion-like sounds. The oxygen-rich ice is a food resource for many animals; cormorants, guillemots, kittiwakes and the rare praise gull is often seen nearby. Seals often live in the ice in front of the glacier and the great eagle can be spotted here. You may also come across grouse, hare and small arctic fox.

DAY 7 - Qeqertarsuaq

Qeqertarsuaq means the large island and it is indeed Greenland's largest island. It lies in the middle of Disko Bay, about 70 km from the mainland and can be reached in a day's sailing. The island is different

from the rest of Greenland due to its volcanic origin and its landscape is characterised by red-tinged basalt mountains, verdant hilltops, interesting rock figures and hot springs. Disko Island is well-known for its beautiful nature, abundant flora and interesting geology, that made geological surveys possible from 1848. In 1906, the Arctic Station was founded here and it is now the oldest manned field station in the arctic region. The Arctic Station conducts research on bio and geo-related problems. If we are lucky, staff from the station may come aboard and share some insight into their work and reasearch.

The main town of Qeqertarsuaq is also called Qeqertarsuaq and has approximately, 850 residents. Qeqertarsuaq was founded in 1773 and is beautifully located by Disko Bay, on a peninsula, in a natural harbor. From spring to autumn, the area around Disko Island becomes a meeting ground for large whales such as bowhead whale and humpback whales - a perfect place to Zodiac cruise for possible whale encounters. In the 17th Century, the first whaling stations were established on Disko Island and the optimal fishing areas drew many European whaling expeditions here. Being located nearer to the Arctic Circle, you will experience the Midnight Sun here, an experience that you won't have south of Sisimiut.

DAY 8 - Uummannaq

Uummannaq is surrounded by steep islands and an endless supply of icebergs from the Qarajaq Glacier. Uummannaq, meaning heart-like, is the centrepiece of an archipelago where everyday hunting and fishing plays out in the middle of one of nature's grandest creations, in Greenland. As the ship approaches Uummannaq, have your camera ready and be out on deck as the vista is simply, magnificent. Founded as a Danish colony in 1758 on the mainland, the settlement was moved five years later to this nearby island, where seal hunting was more plentiful. As you wander through the town, through snow and ice, notice the colourful local houses that are so reminiscent of Greenland.

The iconic heart-shaped mountain of Uummannaq, towers over the island and the symbol of the heart is an unmistakable landmark for visitors. Nearby Qilakitsoq, a former settlement, but now an archaeological site, is famous for the discovery of eight mummified bodies in 1972. The mummies which date back to 1475 AD, can now be viewed at the Greenland National Museum in Nuuk. Uummannaq is a great place for Zodiac cruising to explore the coastline, kayaking and hiking.

DAY 9 - Upernavik

We hope to stop at Upernavik. With a name that translates to the Springtime Place, the town has long been associated with Inuit traditions of ice fishing and hunting for sea mammals. A bay dotted with hundreds of islands, the world's largest bird cliffs at Apparsuit and an open-air museum, revealing colonial and Viking histories, see thousands of islands interspersed with icebergs stretching off into the distance. If conditions allow, we will traverse the mesmerising waters of the Upernavik Icefjord.

Climate

Greenland has an Arctic climate with average temperatures in the North that do not exceed 10° C in the warmest summer months. In the southern part of the country and the innermost parts of the long fjords, the temperature can, however, rise to more than 20° C (68° F) in June, July and August.

Estimated costs are provided below for guidance only, are on a per person basis unless shown otherwise, and may depend on the number of participants. Please note: These activities are booked and paid for direct with the supplier and do not form part of your Explore holiday contract.

Whilst landings are included in the cost of your trip as per the outline itinerary, some departures aboard the MV Greg Mortimer have additional optional excursions which can be pre-booked with the ship operator directly. These will be charged at an additional fee, depending on the excursion and we recommend booking these in advance to ensure availability. Please speak to a member of our Polar team who will advise you on the booking process.

Clothing

Parkas

A complimentary parka is provided for you on board the ship and is yours to keep after the voyage. It has a comfortable wind-resistant inner jacket, which is detachable from the waterproof outer shell, and is

designed to be worn over your essential base layers.

Gloves

Keeping your hands warm and dry can be a challenge. Thin polypropylene gloves can be worn underneath warm outergloves. This allows you some protection from the cold when removing your gloves to operate your camera etc. We strongly recommend that you bring more than one pair of gloves, in case one gets wet (or lost).

Hat/Cap

Warm, woollen hat/cap to protect your ears, as well as a scarf, neck gaiter or other face protection, such as a balaclava.

Trousers

Water-resistant trousers of coated nylon or, even better, Gore-Tex® are essential for your comfort. They can be worn over your regular clothes to keep you warm and dry. We suggest that you purchase trousers a few sizes larger than you normally wear as you will be wearing them over other clothing. Gore-Tex® or similar fabrics are excellent for keeping out wind and water without trapping excess heat. Rain gear and Gore-Tex® products can be found in any outdoor sport clothing store. In addition to your waterproof trousers, warm ski pants are suggested if you have them. Warm trousers such as jeans, corduroys etc are also good.

Socks

Warm wool socks worn over a thin pair of silk, polypropylene socks should provide enough warmth and insulation for your feet. Bring several pairs of socks, since you will inevitably get your feet wet.

Outer Clothing Woollen, knit or cotton sweaters/tops, polar fleece tops (medium weight), several cotton turtlenecks and T-shirts for layering on and off the ship.

Underclothing

Thermal underwear is highly recommended as it will keep you warm without adding bulk. Most polar travellers prefer a lightweight version.

Footwear

Complimentary waterproof boots will be supplied on-board. However, if you have extra small or large feet, you are advised to bring your own. Also ensure you take good walking boots and trainers for relaxing.

Ship description

The MV Greg Mortimer is a 104-metre ship, purpose-built in 2019 for expedition travel. Capable of negotiating the strongest winds and waves, the vessel is being built to world-class polar standards and has been designed in close consultation with expedition specialists. The MV Greg Mortimer is limited to just 120 passengers and guests can enjoy some added comforts such as spacious stateroom cabins, a large mud room with easy boarding access and a hydraulic viewing platform, offering unobstructed views of the wildlife. Other features include a library, Wellness Centre with a gym, sauna and spa and a multimedia room for keen photographers wishing to edit their photos after a day of exploration. As a modern and custom-designed ship, this vessel is at the cutting edge of nautical technology and will ensure a comfortable and safe passage through polar waters.

Cabins

The lead-in prices on our website are based on triple outward facing, Stateroom cabins. All staterooms have private bathrooms, ample storage, with twin beds. Many of the stateroom categories, have floor to ceiling windows that offer prime observation opportunities around the clock. Additionally, there are

private balconies in most of the staterooms, allowing you to watch the world float past and take in the salty air of the open ocean. Your confirmed cabin type will appear on your Booking Confirmation, which will be sent on receipt of your deposit payment.

Ship dining

Meals are served in the large, spacious dining room with an open seating arrangement, perfect for swapping stories with your extended expedition family. A range of courses is offered at each meal time and you can enjoy a variety of house wines, beers and soft drinks which are included with your evening meal. Complimentary coffee, tea and snacks are available throughout the day and any additional drinks can be purchased at the fully-stocked bar.

Joining Tour Abroad

Customers booked on the 'Land Only' arrangements will receive a Free Transfer, provided you arrive and depart on the tour only itinerary start and end dates. The complimentary transfers will be arranged from the Explore designated airport or train station to your trips joining point, and then back from the ending point to the designated airport or train station. Generally the airport or station that Explore have selected will be the one that is closest to the town or city where the trip starts, or the one nearest to the joining point. It will be either an airport or train station but not both.

The exception to this rule is customers who are booked on a tour where the joining and ending point is at the designated airport or train station.

Free transfers are not available for Self-Guided, Polar, Tailormade or Tours for Churches customers. If you are not eligible for the Free Transfer then you will need to make your own way through to the joining and ending point. On a majority of our tours Explore will be able to provide a private transfer at an additional cost. Please ask for a quote at the time of booking.
